Ethiopia National Quality and Safety Summit 2021 Proceedings Report

The Federal Ministry of Health, Ethiopia hosted a National Quality and Safety Summit on 6 & 7 May 2021 with the theme: "*People centered and integrated health services: the pathway for better clinical outcomes and confidence in the system*". The aim of the summit was to share the learnings from MNH Quality Improvement initiatives and other key quality improvement programs in Ethiopia. A proceedings report drafted by the FMOH, is now made available on <u>the QoC Network website</u> to share the experience and learning in Ethiopia. In September 2021, the outcomes and next steps will be presented as part of the Network's National Forum webinar series.

Nigeria's Maternal and Perinatal Database for Quality, Equity, Dignity (MPD-4-QED)

The Maternal and Perinatal Database for Quality, Equity and Dignity (MPD-4-QED) works across a network of 54 public and private referral level facilities in Nigeria. MPD-4-QED uses a nationwide electronic system to collect data on maternal and perinatal events during labour, childbirth and the early neonatal period. Data is routinely extracted from the hospital records of every pregnant woman and uploaded to a web-based DHIS2 dashboard by designated trained medical records officers. For maternal or perinatal deaths, the designated hospital coordinators conduct audits to determine the primary causes of deaths and the contributing factors. It is backed by the World Health Organization, UNICEF and UNFPA, and supported by a growing partnership of development organisations, NGOs, professional associations and universities.

It is underpinned by the values of quality, equity and dignity and contributes to achieving the targets of the Every Woman Every Child Global Strategy for Women's, Children's and Adolescents' Health.
