Ghana's National Quality of Care for Maternal, Newborn and Child Health Forum

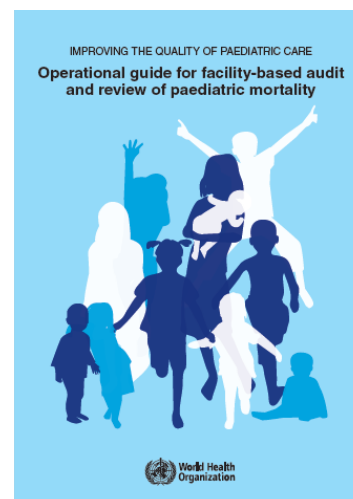


The Ministry of Health of Ghana with the support of partners hosted the third National Patient Safety and Healthcare Quality Conference from 15 to 17 September 2021. With the theme 'No Quality, no coverage – Safe maternal and newborn care now!', sessions over the 3 days were titled under 'Safety at the point of care', 'Community engagement in advancing the quality of care', and 'Policy and programme approaches to quality and patient safety'. The materials from the meeting will shortly be made available on the Network website. In the coming weeks, the Network Secretariat will host a National Forum webinar with the MoH of Ghana to share the outcome of discussions at the National Forum including the challenges overcome, practical solutions and lessons learned in implementing and scaling-up quality of care for MNH.

Learning workshop: Expanding the implementation of Paediatric Death Audit and Mortality Review in the African Region

The WHO Regional Office for Africa with the support of UNICEF, Momentum Country and Global Leadership, and USAID organized a learning workshop for 17 countries in the African Region from 7 to 9 September 2021. The purpose was to advance the use of paediatric death audits and mortality review to improve the quality of care for child health services. 17 countries participated: Botswana, Burkina Faso, Cote D'Ivoire, Ethiopia, Eswatini, Ghana, Kenya, Malawi, Mozambique, Nigeria, Rwanda, Sierra Leone, South Africa, Tanzania, Uganda, Zambia and Zimbabwe. Countries shared experiences and emerging lessons from implementation and developed national plans of action for implementation.

Virtual workshop: Building capacity within the African region for National Quality Policy and Strategy

The Quality of Care Unit in the WHO Department of Integrated Health Services and the WHO Regional Office for Africa organized a two half-day virtual meeting on quality of care on September 28 & 29 2021. The meeting titled *Building Capacity within the African Region for National Quality Policy and Strategy* was attended by over 500 participants across the 47 countries in the WHO Africa Region. The first day of the v-workshop allowed countries to hear about technical resources and support opportunities available to countries on quality of care. The second day was designed for countries who have embarked on setting a national strategic direction on quality to share their experience widely, building on an initial meeting of this 8-country cohort back in 2019. Participants at the meeting included Ministries of Health, WHO Country Offices, and individuals with an interest in quality of care in the African Region. WHO AFRO is developing a short meeting report from the deliberations that will be available shortly.

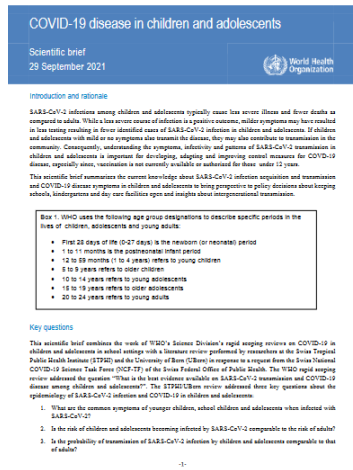


Scientific Brief on COVID-19 in children and adolescents

SARS-CoV-2 infections among children and adolescents cause less severe illness and fewer deaths compared to adults. While a less severe course of infection is a positive outcome, there are concerns that mild symptoms may have led to less testing, resulting in fewer identified cases of COVID-19 in children.

This Scientific Brief summarizes the current knowledge around SARS-CoV-2 infection acquisition and transmission and COVID-19 disease symptoms in children and adolescents. It aims to inform decisions, based on local contexts, on how to best keep schools, kindergarten and day-care facilities open and what advice to apply to intergenerational mixing.

Call for sharing documents and tools on the topic of the experience of or satisfaction with newborn care

Deadline: 20th October 2021

WHO's Department of Maternal, Newborn, Child and Adolescent Health and Ageing has commissioned a scoping review in order to better understand and standardize the different dimensions of experience and satisfaction with newborn care. A paper will be developed that compiles and summarizes measurement tools and indicators that can help guide research and action for respectful care of newborns.

While efforts have been placed towards improving women and newborns' experience of care and to ensuring respectful person-centered care during childbirth, there is still no agreement on what constitutes the experience of newborn care. This review will build on the extensive work done to capture women's experiences during maternity care and will complement it by assessing tools and indicators to measure experience of newborn care, and satisfaction with care during the postnatal period.

Please share any literature, including academic articles, white papers, (project) reports, measurement tools or topic guides, etc., covering issues related to experience of or satisfaction with newborn care, including mistreatment of the newborn. More countries are expected to join the Network. It is backed by the World Health Organization, UNICEF and UNFPA, and supported by a growing partnership of development organisations, NGOs, professional associations and universities.

It is underpinned by the values of quality, equity and dignity and contributes to achieving the targets of the *Every Woman Every Child Global Strategy for Women's, Children's and Adolescents' Health*.
